LANGUAGE

There are ethical implications surrounding the language used when talking about the sex industry.

Are we building bridges, or tearing them down?

'Sex Worker'

- Used by some escorts to describe their work positively embrace this term.
- Women exchanging sex for a place to sleep may not identify with this term and feel it is relevant to them, therefore they don't engage with support.
- It may be offensive to someone who has been or is currently being sexually exploited, trafficked or coerced into selling sex by a partner.

There is not a way of doing it (selling sex) that is not dangerous [...] There is every kind of risk. I want to tell other women involved that "it's not worth it. It's not safe. It doesn't matter how brave you are, you will come across trouble.

Trauma Informed Approach



NOT

"What's wrong with you?"

BUT

"What happened to you?"

I think during this time I have learned the magnitude that trauma can have on someone and that this is not to be taken lightly. It can trickle down into relationships and affect them.
