Clair Howell, The Clock Tower Sanctuary

I have lived and worked in Brighton for the past 25 years, with over a decade of experience in the voluntary sector. I currently work with the Clock Tower Sanctuary, a charity supporting young people experiencing homelessness, and I'm also on the board of trustees for Community Works.

My role at the Clock Tower Sanctuary is Operations Impact and Data Manager, which gives me both strategic and operational oversight. My expertise includes leadership practice, financial management, restricted funding, data analysis, impact measurement, and HR processes. I take a systems-change approach, with a strong focus on quality assurance, compliance, and outcome-based planning and evaluation.

I'm committed to co-developing solutions with individuals who have lived experience, ensuring that services are shaped by the people who use them. I'm passionate about creating meaningful change and amplifying voices through inclusive, collaborative practice—something I'm excited to bring to my role at Community Works.



Diana Penly

I have lived in Brighton and Sussex for the last 30+ years. I have 25 years' experience in a financial organisation and have worked in projects, IT, product development and operations. Most recently, I was in a senior leadership role developing strategy and delivering large scale change programmes across global teams.

I am currently involved with running and organising a number of local environmental and arts charities and groups across Sussex. I have found working with the voluntary sector to be very rewarding and have developed a better understanding of the differing and common challenges faced.

Community Works is a critical part of the local voluntary and community ecosystem. I hope that in joining the Board of Trustees I can offer skills and experience from previous and recent roles to help navigate through the current sector challenges.

Geoff Brown, Macmillan Horizon Centre

I am the Centre Manager of the Macmillan Horizon Centre, which opened in November 2016. The Horizon Centre is based opposite the Royal Sussex and is a purpose-built Information & Support Centre to support people living with and affected by cancer.

Before joining Macmillan, I managed Citizens Advice 1066 in Hastings and I spent 16 years at Voluntary Service Overseas (VSO) as a volunteer Programme Manager in China, Country Director in the Philippines and Head of Volunteering Development based in London. In the last role I was responsible for developing new international volunteer programmes, including the development of programmes to engage 18-25-year olds in International volunteering; the development of international volunteer recruitment bases in Manila, Delhi and Nairobi as well as a programme to promote and support volunteering in the Countries where VSO had programmes.

Whilst working at Citizens Advice in Hastings I was on the Board of Hastings Voluntary Action (HVA) and Hasting Advice Resource Centre (HARC). I hope that by joining the Board of Community Works I will be able to play a small role in helping to strengthen and build the support available to voluntary and community groups in Brighton and Hove.
